Barry Blake Washington City

Barry will reach an incredible milestone of 35 years of fulltime service to Washington City on August 6, 2025. As the Leisure Services Director, Barry has been the driving force behind creating one of the strongest Parks & Recreation Divisions in Utah.

When Barry was hired in 1990, Washington City had just one park (Veterans Park), a small cemetery and a single baseball/ softball field. Under his visionary leadership, the city has since developed 16 additional parks, a regional soccer complex with four soccer fields, and a robust trail system that now spans 30+ miles within the community. Barry also played a pivotal role in the development and ongoing success of the Green Spring Golf Course. Furthermore, he was instrumental in acquiring land and overseeing the construction of the 110,000-square-foot Community Center, a cornerstone for community activities and events.



In Barry's 35 years he has seen the City of Washington grow from 4,000 residents to 40,000 residents. Under his supervision he has seen the Leisure Service Department grow from its creation with 3 employees to its current size of 350 employees. Barry's dedication, innovation, and commitment to enhancing recreational opportunities have left an indelible mark on Washington City, making him a true asset and deserving of recognition for his outstanding service.







OUTSTANDING (ITIZEN

Donalda Day & Valerie Jueschke

St George Parks & Community Services

Since their involvement with the City of St. George, Donalda and Valerie have significantly enriched the outreach education field trips at the Tonaquint Nature Center, sharing their knowledge of local birds and their adaptations with over a thousand elementary-aged students each year. Their interactive lessons, including demonstrations of how birds use their beaks for survival, provide students with a hands-on understanding of the natural world.

Through their teamwork and countless hours, they've made field trips both educational and engaging, fostering a deeper connection to nature among the youth of St. George. Their efforts have also expanded the outreach capacity of the Tonaquint Nature Center, allowing more students and schools to participate in these valuable programs. Their commitment to education and love for the outdoors have left a lasting impact on the children and the community.





Ty Empey St George Parks & Community Services

Ty Empey has been an advocate for recovering addicts by establishing a softball league in St. George, called Clean and Sober, a program that fosters connection, support, and belonging for people in recovery. During his personal recovery journey, Ty participated in a similar softball league in northern Utah, which helped him rebuild relationships with his family. When Ty moved to St. George 7 years ago and discovered there was no softball league to help recovering addicts, he decided to create one to provide other recovering individuals the same opportunity to build relationships and be part of a team.

Ty started the league in Hurricane, but as the league grew, the need for more fields became clear. Ty approached the City with a unique proposal to keep the league going: exchanging league members' service for field rental fees. The city embraced the idea, and for the past four years, Ty and the league members have volunteered at events like the

St. George Marathon, 4th of July celebrations, park and city cleanups, and various races and community events, keeping the league alive and supporting the community of St. George.

Bart Hopkin

Cottonwood Heights Parks & Recreation Service Area

Bart Hopkin has been with Cottonwood Heights Parks & Recreation Service Area for over 42 years, holding key leadership roles. From 1983 to 2005, he served on the Board of Trustees, shaping the community's recreational offerings. In 2005, he became the Assistant Director and Fiscal Manager, overseeing financial operations until 2013. After a brief break, he returned to the Board in 2014 and continues to serve. Mr. Hopkin was instrumental in several major projects, including the outdoor pool remodeling, the addition of water features, and collaboration during the 2002 Winter Olympics. Recently, he contributed to the master planning of Antczak Park, upgraded in 2024. He also served on the National Recreation and Parks Association Board and received the Meritorious Service Award from the American Parks and Recreation Society.







Dheeraj Jonnalagadda

They are always researching seed blends and looking for ways to decrease the amount of water required in a landscape, especially in lawn areas. To this end Chanshare is active with the Northern Utah Coalition of Chambers (NUCC), Salt Lake Chamber, and other organizations, to monitor and influence legislation centered on conservation, which could potentially have negative unintended consequences on the landscape industry and professional

groundskeepers. As a partner with URPA Chanshare has spent the last 3 years working with educators and industry professionals to delist Bermudagrass from the Noxious Weeds List in Utah. Chanshare has also been sponsors to several URPA Seminars this year and consistently works with professional groundskeepers to provide conservation minded maintenance best practice suggestions.

Chanshare spent the last 3 years working with educators from BYU and USU and other industry professionals to get Triploid Hybrid Bermudagrass delisted from the Noxious Weeds list. This has the potential to change Parks and Playing Fields in Utah, allowing them to flourish while using 50% less water than the traditional bluegrass playing surface.

St. George Running Center

Grapevine Trailhead

Washington Leisure Services

The Grapevine Trailhead serves as a gateway to an extensive trail network within the Red Cliffs Desert Reserve and National Conservation Area. As the largest trailhead in Washington City it features designated parking areas for horse trailers and vehicles, along with various amenities. Spanning 9 acres, the multi-use trailhead includes 92 asphalt parking spaces, 57 unpaved overflow parking spaces, and 10 stalls for trucks with horse trailers, complete with a horse tie-up area. The site also boasts a spacious,

enclosed restroom facility with four individual restrooms, a large sink for handwashing, and a detailed wall map of the Red Cliffs Desert Reserve trails. Additional features include a large covered seating area designed to lower temperatures to give hikers and bikers a break from the heat, bicycle repair stations, and water filling stations for both people and horses.

The conservation features include spacious shade areas designed to provide comfort and reduce heat exposure. Bathrooms are partially built underground to naturally regulate temperatures, maintaining usability during both high and low extremes. A drinking water station ensures safe hydration for visitors. The landscaping is designed with drought-tolerant plants and intentionally excludes turf grass, promoting sustainable water use and reducing maintenance needs. These features reflect a commitment to environmentally conscious design and resource conservation.

Rock Canyon Trailhead Improvements

Provo Parks & Recreation

The Rock Canyon Trailhead Improvement project stands as a beacon of conservation and sustainability in Provo, Utah. A collaborative effort between Provo City, the Rock Canyon Preservation Alliance, and the US Forest Service, has significantly enhanced the local community's access to outdoor recreation while preserving the natural beauty of Rock Canyon. The project included the improvements of existing trails, the creation of new interpretive trails, a new rock-climbing wall with fall protection, and a new amphitheater.



The Rock Canyon Trailhead now serves as a vital hub for hiking, rock climbing, base jumping, and nature programs, promoting the value of outdoor recreation. The enhancements have addressed critical issues of overcrowding and parking shortages, providing expanded parking facilities, new year-round restrooms, and trail wayfinding signage. This has not only improved visitor experience but also reduced the strain on local infrastructure.



Traverse Mountain Open Space

Lehi City Parks

As Lehi continues to grow, open space is being swallowed by ever increasing sprawl. Communities are being built anywhere land is available. The Traverse Mountain Conservation Easement was an effort to preserve 902 acres of prime open space. Land donated to Lehi City by development enabled city leaders the opportunity to pass a resolution placing a conservation easement on the land above the Traverse Mountain planned community in perpetuity. Lehi worked with Draper City, to preserve this special place. The permanent protection and preservation of natural habitat, wildlife, endangered

species, scenic values, historic preservation, water quality and prime outdoor recreation highlight the easement.

With access to the nearby Flight Park and Draper's Corner Canyon, the Traverse Mountain Conservation Easement met a significant community need. Residents of Lehi, along with members of the Utah community, and visitors from outside Utah all can enjoy the benefits of this easement. As Lehi City, and Utah continue to grow, our ability to enjoy the natural value of the Wasatch Front needs to be preserved whenever, and wherever possible. The Traverse Mountain Conservation easement represents this need. Forward thinking elected officials along with city staff and community members rallied to make this easement possible. As a result, generations will enjoy the value and beauty of this beautiful open space. A legacy well preserved!

Eric was deeply impressed by the thoughtfulness and effort Rosili put into her designs, and he knew her contributions deserved recognition.

To honor Rosili's dedication, Clearfield Community Services involved her in the design process for the next playground the city planned to install. Rosili played a crucial role in selecting the elements she liked most, and her recommendations were incorporated into the final design, including the color scheme. Her proactive approach and positive attitude are a shining example of community engagement that Clearfield City strives to exemplify and reflect to represent residents like Rosili.



SoJo Coloring Caravan


By incorporating hands-on art into city events, the SoJo Coloring Caravan enhances participation and raises awareness of South Jordan's arts and

A few things he's implemented in the short few months he's been with Orem Recreation include but are not limited to: restructuring some skills and required steps to a scale to communicate progress to parents without a pass/fail system, involving brilliant design to create an eyecatching progress report, and most importantly automating the entire system so each parent and child feel that their experience is individually important to our facility. Next phases include additional automation for our swim teams, private swim lessons, and adorable child friendly swag that will contribute to their experience and guarantee their return.







INNOVATION OF THE YEAR &

Innovative Uintah Recreation Center Revitalization

Uintah Special Service District 1

Uintah Special Service District 1 (USSD1) is proud to nominate our Recreation Hall Revitalization for the 2025 Utah Recreation and Parks Association (URPA) Innovation of the Year Award. This transformative project breathed new life into a once-underutilized hallway, turning it into a vibrant, energetic hub for families and community members to gather, play, and connect.

The goal was to reimagine a space that had a few outdated ping pong and pool tables into a modern, engaging recreational area that inspires fun and social connection. The Recreation Hall Revitalization exemplifies the mission of parks and recreation by creating meaningful opportunities for connection, recreation, and community building. The project demonstrates how innovation and thoughtful design can enhance operations and deliver substantial benefits to the community.





Adapting Together: Strengthening Community Through City Collaboration

Pleasant Grove Recreation

Adding adaptive programming can be challenging due to resource constraints and specialized training involved. After a mother with a child with disabilities emailed, hoping to find a Junior Jazz program her son could participate in, we recognized the need to address this gap. The first of many meetings was held, bringing together recreation professionals from Pleasant Grove, Cedar Hills, Lehi, and American Fork. From this meeting, we developed a regional approach to adaptive programming. The idea was simple but powerful: each city would focus on offering one adaptive program, ensuring that collectively we could provide a diverse range of adaptive sports and activities.

To streamline access, we implemented collective marketing efforts and created a centralized website where parents could easily find information about adaptive programs regionally. This unified approach not only maximized resources but also expanded opportunities for families.

ASL Swim Lessons

Salt Lake County Parks & Recreation

Continuing to improve access and inclusivity in recreation services, the Adaptive Rec team at Salt Lake County (SLCO) added ASL-LTS—that's learn-to-swim for people with hearing impairments who speak American Sign Language (ASL).

Providing swim lessons to people with hearing impairments is vital to safety and provides meaningful recreation to improve physical health. Participants with hearing loss often don't have access to swim lessons or aren't aware they can request an interpreter for this service. This leaves individuals vulnerable to drowning and also



leave them feeling isolated from their swimming peers. Thanks to a partnership with the Utah School for the Deaf and Blind, SLCO Adaptive Rec is now offering ASL swim lessons with plans to grow. By partnering with USDB, the SLCO Adaptive team provided swimming lesson instruction and USBD provided ASL certified interpreters. Utah School for the Deaf and Blind advertised these lessons to their students and their guardians, and covered registration costs. The partnership provided four swim lesson sessions to 17 kids ages 3-7. Salt Lake County Adaptive Rec continued lessons by employing the interpretive services of 5-Star Interpreting. Instructors currently offer ASL lessons 2-3 times a month for 4-6 students with plans to grow. Parents of current students are enthusiastic about spreading the word for these ASL swim lessons.

Adaptive Aquatics

South Davis Recreation District

Our Adaptive Aquatics program addresses a critical gap in many communities, offering individuals with special needs the opportunity to safely engage in aquatic activities. This population often faces significant barriers to participation, and our program provides a solution through individualized, one-on-one swimming lessons tailored to meet the specific needs of each participant. By doing so, we enable individuals who may struggle in traditional group lessons to gain essential water safety skills and confidence in and around water.

Empower Fitness

Uintah Special Service District 1

The Empower Fitness Class is an inclusive program designed for individuals with diverse abilities, offering a safe, supportive environment for physical activity. The program promotes strength, independence, and well-being while fostering community and social connection.

Key Highlights Include; Accessibility: Adaptive exercises accommodate various physical and cognitive abilities. Impact: Increased participation and success stories demonstrate improved strength, confidence, and health outcomes. Collaborations:



Partnerships with local organizations and healthcare providers enhance program offerings. Qualified Instructors: Certified instructors provide personalized, adaptive support. Community: Builds camaraderie and inclusion among participants. The Empower Fitness Class was envisioned as an inclusive, transformative program to serve individuals with diverse physical and cognitive abilities. Its mission is to provide a safe, supportive space where participants can build strength, independence, and confidence while fostering a sense of community and belonging.



Thunder Junction Spook-track-ular

St George Parks & Community Services

The Thunder Junction Spook-track-ular is a premier annual Halloween activity held at Thunder Junction All Abilities Park in St. George, Utah. Designed to serve families, individuals of all abilities, and visitors from the surrounding region, the event has become a cherished community tradition. With engaging activities, and festive decorations, the Spook-track-ular delivers a magical experience for attendees of all ages. Highlights include trick-or-treating stations, a haunted train ride, costume contest, and adaptive activities, ensuring accessibility and inclusivity for everyone. The event is made possible through strong community partnerships, including

the active involvement of the St. George Youth City Council, whose members provide free face painting for attendees. Their participation adds an interactive and personal touch to the event, showcasing the spirit of youth engagement and volunteerism. Local businesses, have donated delicious treats for our "Dessert Walk" held at the event, helping keep costs low. City departments also collaborate to enhance the event and foster a sense of community pride.

By prioritizing accessibility and creating a welcoming environment, the Thunder Junction Spook-track-ular has addressed a need for inclusive activities in the community. By being held at an all-abilities park, the event offers individuals with disabilities and their families a space where they can fully participate in holiday festivities. The event's thoughtful design, strong partnerships, and commitment to inclusivity have ensured that the Thunder Junction Spook-track-ular remains a beloved tradition in southern Utah.





Water Fitness Program

Oquirrh Recreation & Parks District

The Water Fitness program at KOPFC has provided water exercise and social interactions for the community for decades. 2024 was the best year in program history with 14,073 patron visits and an average of 18.7 patrons per class. Certain classes are consistently over 30 participants with highs in the 40's!

Much of the success of the program can be attributed to our ten experienced and energetic instructors, as well as their ability to have the freedom to develop workouts that they enjoy teaching. The instructors are encouraged to name their own class to focus on their area of expertise or simply on a topic they enjoy teaching. KOPFC offers a variety of teaching styles and class themes. From Aqua Dance with choreographed exercises and awesome music, to Wave Warriors for a high intensity workout, to our specialized Easy Does It 45-minute class suitable for seniors, those recovering from surgery, and even moms-to-be.





J.E.T.S. Clearfield Community Services

The Clearfield Aquatic and Fitness Center employs over 160 employees. These employees include: lifeguards, swim instructors, fitness instructors, welcome desk attendants, coaches and day care attendants. We wanted to develop a program to help motivate and recognize these amazing employees and their accomplishments. We developed J.E.T.S. (Joyful, Example, Teamwork, Safety) to help us in that mission. Embracing the city's mission and vision of being a "military city" and utilizing our 8 core values we incorporated these into the J.E.T.S. Program. We created stickers and beads to help us award "On-the-Spot" awards and then criteria to motivate all employees to be able to receive a CAFC

"Letterman's Jacket". The program "took off" and we will be implementing this going forward to help grow our team in providing a place where people want to be!

Each supervisor helped develop the criteria for their teams with the goal to be to push people, but making the award "obtainable" to all staff. Of our 160 employees, 55 achieved the recognition. We also awarded 8 staff members "Core Value Awards". This came with their own personalized "Funko Pop" and monetary awards. We presented these awards at an award banquet at a local movie theater.

NeuroPong St. George Parks & Community Services

In 2016, Colorado-based OB/GYN Dr. Anthony Barbera was diagnosed with muscular sclerosis, ending his three-decade surgical career. But after his discovery that playing table tennis greatly relieved his symptoms, Dr. Barbera launched an international nonprofit called Table Tennis Connections (TTC), whose main focus is NeuroPong, a table tennis program tailored to those with MS, Parkinson's, and other neurodegenerative

The City of St. George has partnered with Dr. Barbera to bring NeuroPong to those in our community who are dealing with similar physical issues. Now, each Monday and



Wednesday from noon to 2 p.m., six tables in our Recreation Center (as well as balls and paddles) are devoted to NeuroPong, accommodating 24 excited, engaged players, many of whom are never otherwise involved in physical activity or exercise (the City of St George generously donated space and two tables to the program). For those afflicted with balance, memory, muscle and other limitations, the impact has been enormous: Finding a community of people who share the same challenges - and finding unconditional support and acceptance - has sparked profound improvements in participants' physical and mental well-being. The tables are consistently full, and enthusiastic "word of mouth" continues to grow the program.

SoJo Ranger & Outdoor Camps

South Jordan City



The SoJo Ranger and Outdoor Camp program is an outstanding initiative that connects youth to nature through hands-on learning in fishing, archery, and environmental education. Serving children ages 7-18, this program fosters outdoor skills, confidence, and environmental stewardship. Recognized for its impact, the program was recently awarded a UCORE grant to expand participation, ensuring more youth can engage with the outdoors.

This program directly responds to a growing community need for accessible outdoor recreation. By offering low-cost, beginner-friendly activities, it provides suburban youth with meaningful nature experiences close to home. The program's popularity is evident, with registration filling within hours and demand consistently exceeding capacity.

With support from UCORE, SoJo Recreation will increase participation from 144 to 270 youth, enhancing accessibility and sustainability. By equipping future generations with outdoor skills and conservation awareness, the SoJo Ranger and Outdoor Camp program exemplifies innovation and commitment to community well-being.

The vision of the SoJo Ranger and Outdoor Camp program is to provide South Jordan youth with accessible, hands-on outdoor experiences that foster recreation skills, confidence, and environmental stewardship. Serving children ages 7-18, this program introduces fishing, archery, and conservation education in a safe and supportive environment.

7 on 7 High School Flag Football

Spanish Fork Parks & Recreation

Our High School Flag Football league is unlike any other Flag Football league. We have combined the rules from UHSAA High School Regulation 7 on 7 Football, that is played by the High School teams in the summer time, and traditional Flag Football rules to create a league that our High School participants love.

These rules include fun niches to the game like interceptions counting for three points, a four second sack clock, no blocking, and a heavy emphasis on the passing game. This was done in part to reduce the amount of physical contact in the league. The league promotes a fast passed, high energy game that keeps the participants entertained and engaged through the entirety of the contest. In the league we also have decided to let the



participants create their own teams. Teams submit a roster form with the contact information of each participant, each participant then signs up and pays for their registrations individually. We also include participants that don't have a group of friends to register for the league, but still have the desire to play by having a free agent list that we create teams from or add these free agents to teams without a full roster.

The league was founded as we have seen a decrease in participation from our youth in High School sanctioned sports. Many kids in our community of this age still have a love for sports and want the opportunities to participate in the sports that they love. This being the case we decided to create this 7 on 7 league to provide more opportunities for High School students to participate in sports no matter their ability level.

A full dress rehearsal the day before opening integrates all elements—lighting, pyrotechnics, and music—for a magical preview. Blending arts with outdoor recreation, the Millcreek Magic Ice Show unites families and creates shared experiences. It exemplifies how creativity, community spirit, and passion can create something truly special.



The Utah Healing Field in Sandy City is held annually to honor and remember those lost on September 11, 2001. Established in 2002 as the first healing field in the nation, the event transforms the Sandy City Promenade Park into a sea of over 3,000 American flags, each representing a life lost in the tragic events of that day.

Visitors are invited to walk among the flags, which include names and brief biographies, creating a profound reminder of the human impact and resilience following the attacks. The event fosters unity and reflection, drawing families and community members to pay their respects.

In addition to the 9/11 tribute, the Utah Fallen field displays 300+ flags to honor Utah officers, first responders, and K9s who sacrificed their lives in service. This powerful addition emphasizes the continued dedication of our heroes. Installing over 3,350 flags requires skilled Parks & Rec employees and hundreds of enthusiastic volunteers, including high school clubs, church groups, and families. The flags remain on display for 5–7 days, during which employees handle maintenance and upkeep.







OUTSTANDING SPE

Sensory Santa West Valley City Parks & Recreation

Our community loves our annual Christmas events but for some the crowds and bustling atmosphere can be tricky to navigate. Bolstered by the observed need and impact of our adaptive fitness classes, we decided to hold yet another Christmas special event. Our Sensory Santa event offered 'a sensory friendly experience for children and adults within every spectrum of special needs'. Goals were to eliminate or reduce wait times, crowds, noise, and provide a truly personalized, flexible, and magical experience. We did this by having participants register for a 15-minute window within which they had 5 uninterrupted minutes with the Clauses. This meant those ready could go right in and those that needed more



time to 'warm up' also had time. We called each party ahead of time for information such as triggers, cognition, and hobbies/ interests. The information gathered was used to prepare staff for each arrival and allowed Mrs. C to present each visitor a low-cost personalized gift based on their interests. This gift proved to be quite useful in creating engagement and certainly added some magic. Teen TechnaBLAST

Eagle Mountain City

Teen TechnaBLAST is an engaging and informative technology-focused event designed to inspire and educate tweens and teens in our community. Featuring a diverse range of businesses and career paths in STEM, trade careers, and government fields, the event aims to spark passion and imagination among youth while providing essential career exploration opportunities. Additionally, Teen TechnaBLAST promotes the importance of mental well-being, fostering resilience and community connection among participants.

The event has several key objectives: to provide a fun and stimulating environment where youth can explore potential career paths; to amplify youth voices by collaborating with local schools and addressing current challenges facing today's young people; and to support at-risk youth, including youth with disabilities, by promoting inclusivity and reducing negative stereotypes and stigma. Teen TechnaBLAST features various career-driven booths with hands-on activities and demonstrations. Attendees can engage in virtual reality experiences, explore robotics, and learn about careers in technology, medicine, fire safety, law enforcement, and the skilled trades. Music and theater-related activities will also be available, offering creative outlets for youth interested in the arts. The event will conclude with a performance by a teen band from the School of Rock and an exciting drone show.

Wheels Park Grand Opening

West Jordan City

Kids of all ages, led by Mayor Burton, skated and biked through the banner to officially open our Wheels Park in October. The Wheels Park Grand Opening event welcomed our community to our newest park offering, creating a recreation hub for action sports, an area that was previously underrepresented in West Jordan City. Working with ten local skate partners, we offered lessons for "all wheels" from scooters to BMX riders and roller skaters engaging all the communities in our area and teaching many new skills they can then use in our park throughout the year. In



addition to working with local partners, we had two corporate sponsors who offered free food and helmets to ensure that all those riding were safe. Keeping our attendees safe we partnered with our crossing guards to be at pivotal crosswalks to mitigate traffic and pedestrian interactions and had our bicycle police members throughout the park interacting with the skaters and handing out Wheels Park themed stickers. Having such a big opening for the park showed the community what our new park offered, and by teaching classes during the opening we provided them with the skills to use the park! We look forward to Wheels Park continuing to grow and be one of our highest used park spaces in West Jordan City.

Antczak Park

Cottonwood Heights Parks & Recreation Service Area

Originally established in 1977 and named in honor of board member Don Antczak, Antczak Park has long been a cornerstone of our community. By 2019, the park was showing its age, with deteriorating facilities in need of revitalization. To preserve its role as a hub for recreation, we launched the Antczak Park Project with a comprehensive master plan. Although delayed by the COVID-19 pandemic, the project moved forward in 2022 with critical funding from the CARES Act and Coronavirus Relief Fund.

New post-tension tennis courts were installed, featuring upgraded fencing, pickleball lines, modern lighting, and a timed lighting system, alongside updated landscaping to enhance accessibility. A baseball field was reimagined into a versatile green space, creating more room for community programs. In 2023, the outdated playground was replaced with a larger, dynamic structure, and the pavilion, restrooms, and surrounding areas received fresh paint, drinking



fountains, and thoughtful updates, giving the park a fresh, vibrant look. In 2024, the park embarked on a waterwise project, replacing sod with drip irrigation and low-water plants to reduce waste while improving aesthetics. Baseball and softball fields were also upgraded with new bases, plates, leveling, and conditioner to ensure optimal playability.



Clearfield Aquatic and Fitness Center

Clearfield Community Services

While new facilities are often recognized and celebrated, it's important not to overlook the efforts cities take to reinvest and to ensure that future generations can also enjoy these incredible amenities. This past year, Clearfield has invested in the Aquatic and Fitness Center through various, large, capital projects to help ensure its long-term viability. A completely new roof was installed throughout the center, The comp pool liner and laminate were replaced, as were all tiles around the pool. The city resurfaced the slide and oversaw a critical restoration of the slide stairs. Clearfield City continually supports not only investing in new items for its citizens, but also understands the importance of properly caring for the facilities in which the citizens have already invested. The center turns "20" this year and is well set for the next 20 years!

Cherry Ridge Bike Park Springville City Parks & Recreation

Cherry Ridge Bike Park is the result of a vision from over 5 years ago of building a bike park on vacant city land next to existing public works water tanks. The location is on the foothills above Springville City, just below Spring Creek Canyon. The vision evolved into a 5-acre traditional bike park next to the tanks, with connections to a 20-acre mountain bike skills park in the canyon. This vision became reality in August of 2024, when with the support of grants from both UORG and Utah County the park opened to the public.



The Park is unique as it provides recreation opportunities for all kinds of riders, bikes, and hikers. The lower park has parking, public restrooms, pavilions, an asphalt bicycle playground, professional asphalt pump track, walking trails, and a trail to the canyon park. The canyon has three downhill trails, including the first public side-by-side dual slalom trail in Utah. Park users can enjoy BMX riding, mountain biking, and hiking all from one convenient starting point. In addition, the Bonneville Shoreline Trail crosses through the mountain bike park and riders can continue north or south to more trails in Provo or Hobble Creek Canyon. The park is providing our residents and visitors with a variety of excellent outdoor experiences.






OUTSTANDING FACILITY

Butterfield Canyon Trailhead Regional Park

Salt Lake County Parks & Recreation

Adding an additional 17 miles to the Southwest Canyons Trail Network, Butterfield Canyon Regional Park is a vital addition to Salt Lake County's recreational and open space offerings. This purpose-built, non-motorized trail system, along with a 150-space day-use parking area, caters to a diverse range of outdoor enthusiasts, including: hikers, bikers, runners, equestrians, skiers, and snowshoers. Located 40 minutes Southwest from downtown Salt Lake City, the trail network provides a critical recreational resource in a rapidly growing area.



Now with over 50 miles of trails, the Southwest Canyons Trail Network promotes physical activity, mental well-being, and enjoyment of the region's natural beauty. Butterfield Trails will play a significant role in enhancing the health, well-being, and sense of community in the region, providing a long-lasting and unique amenity to both Salt Lake County and the broader area.



Electric Theater Center

St George Parks & Community Services

The Electric Theater Center stands as a vibrant cornerstone of St. George's cultural landscape, seamlessly blending historic preservation with modern artistic innovation. Established over a century ago, this beloved landmark was transformed by the City of St. George through extensive renovations from 2014 to 2016, emerging as a hub for the arts while preserving historic character.

This versatile facility houses a theater space, art gallery, artist studios, dance rooms, classrooms, and meeting spaces – all available for public rental. This accessibility has proven invaluable for the community's burgeoning arts scene, providing crucial infrastructure for emerging creative organizations. The Center has become home to numerous performing arts groups, hosting everything from dance and theater productions to musical ensembles. It serves as the venue for two growing film festivals – the Desertscape Film Festival and Horrorfest – while supporting visual arts through the Arrowhead Gallery, operated by the Southern Utah Art Guild.

Hillcrest Park Center

Orem Parks & Recreation

Building on the popular trend of indoor/outdoor living, Orem City Recreation created an indoor/outdoor recreation experience with the rehabilitation of Hillcrest Elementary and Hillcrest Park. Due to an aging facility and a reduction in students, Hillcrest Elementary was closed. A small city-owned park adjacent to the school was underused and had little to offer. With the plan to create



a larger 9-acre park for the community, the City of Orem purchased the school property. Most of the school was torn down, and the gym/cafeteria. kitchen area and one class room (which was the most recent addition to the school) was turned into a community center and gym. Additionally, the new Hillcrest Park Center is in a PRIME LOCATION – located directly south of University Mall with major road and public transportation access.



Lehi Family Park

Lehi Parks

Lehi Family Park has redefined community recreation in the region, offering an unparalleled experience through its thoughtful design and commitment to inclusivity. Spanning 45 acres, with an additional 45 acres reserved for future development, the park serves as a hub for connection, recreation, and innovation, addressing critical needs in the surrounding community.

The park's centerpiece is one of the largest all-abilities playgrounds in Utah, a beacon of inclusivity that ensures children of all abilities can play, explore, and thrive together. Complementing the playground is a splash pad longer than a football field, offering a unique and engaging water play experience. Other key features include 20 acres of premier soccer fields, a sensory garden, and an amphitheater that supports cultural events and community gatherings.

West Jordan Wheels Park

Following his retirement, he continued his leadership journey as the Director of the Cottonwood Heights Parks and Recreation Service Area and later as Mayor of Cottonwood Heights.

Mike's leadership has had a profound impact on both regional and national levels, as well as within URPA. He has held various roles on the URPA Board of Directors, including serving as President from 1992 to 1993 and as NRPA Southwest Regional Representative. Epic Sports Park

Provo Parks & Recreation

The Epic Sports Park is a 100-acre sports complex currently featuring 15 multi-purpose athletic fields. On 1 million square feet of Kentucky Bluegrass, the park accommodates a wide range of sports events, proving to be a vital hub for local and regional athletics.

Provo's 330+ local sports teams previously overcrowded it's 11 fields and after the Epic was built it not only solved this bottleneck but also transformed Provo into a regional sports destination. In Fall 2024, two major tournaments generated over \$4 million in economic impact and filled over 5,300 hotel room nights locally. Multi-year contracts and 2025 bookings already exceeding expectations highlight its growing demand.

The park's sustainability initiatives are equally impressive. Sand-capped fields equipped with cloud-based irrigation systems use sensors to monitor soil moisture and ensure precise water conservation. Low impact drainage systems in parking areas capture storm water and reduce water needs, reinforcing its commitment to eco-friendly practices.



Beyond its infrastructure, the park enriches the community. Partnering with local youth leagues and regional sports organizations the Epic provides affordable access and hosts programs that inspire the next generation of athletes. In just the first 6 weeks of operations, the Epic has already served 300+ teams.

The Epic Sports Park exemplifies innovation, sustainability, and community enrichment, making it a deserving candidate for Field of the Year.

Lakeside Sports Park

Orem Parks & Recreation

Centrally located in Utah County with easy access from I-15, Lakeside Sports Park is the home of many local sports enthusiasts and is one of the biggest parks in Orem. This facility hosts leagues and tournaments for both youth and adults for softball, baseball, soccer, rugby, ultimate frisbee, kickball, and football as well as year-round training. Lakeside Park is also a favorite site for cross country meets, hosting 2 high school meets and 3 college meets in 2024, including the WAC cross country championships. A recent remodel of the park included replacing 5 softball/baseball fields (summer 2023) and 2 full-sized soccer fields (summer 2024) with artificial turf, replacing the scoreboards on the softball fields (summer 2023), and adding LED lights (fall 2023) to the



new artificial soccer fields. Heaters were also installed in the bathrooms in fall of 2023. All of these upgrades were designed to accommodate year-round access as organized sports continue to grow.

In large part due to these upgrades, Lakeside Sports Park experienced a visitor increase of 56% in 2024, with more than 100,000 Orem residents enjoying the new facility – a direct benefit to our Orem community. Additionally, over 50,000 visitors came from 50+ miles away. Many of those who visited Lakeside Park, whether local or out of town, contributed to the economy with visits to Orem businesses either just prior to or immediately after the event totaling 66,57 visits. Other communities close by also received an economic boost. Lakeside Sports Park is one of the premier sports parks in the state, and a major player in the sports tourism industry in Utah County.





Nelson Field

Spanish Fork Parks & Recreation

Nelson Field is an iconic baseball field located at the Russell Swenson Memorial Park in Spanish Fork City. The field is owned and operated by the city and maintained by the Spanish Fork Parks Division. Nelson Field was built in the 1950's and has been used for many recreational leagues throughout the years. The field is also home to the 8 time state champion's Spanish Fork Don's. The field has undergone several changes over the years such as new dugouts, new lights, and a new outfield fence, but has always maintained it's iconic character.

Nelson Field is maintained to a high standard of excellence and in 2003 was named the "Turface National Field of the Year". The field is well known throughout the baseball community and many teams look forward to playing on it each year.



Paul Harvey (longtime radio personality) once declare Spanish Fork as the baseball capital of the United States. More people per capita played baseball in Spanish Fork than anywhere else in the country. Nelson Field played a huge part in that declaration. The field has always been a gathering place for our community and will continue to be well into the future.

Oaklawn Football Field

North Ogden Parks & Recreation

Oaklawn Football Field serves as a multipurpose field used in spring and fall time. Back in 2020, the field was renovated to give us a blanket canvas to work with to improve the overall quality and playability. We were able to fraise mow the field to remove the unwanted grass but leave the good native soil. After the turf was removed, we laser graded the field and planted a high-quality Bluegrass/Rye Grass Mix. In 2021, the state suffered from the drought and that brought plenty of challenges to keep the field in tip top shape. During and after that year we were able to get on a great fertilizer program to help keep the turf green and healthy. Every year during the peak of the summer heat, we throw out a good water retention and infiltration agent that helps us cut down on water but keep the turf healthy. Given the level of maintenance that Oaklawn requires, the parks team has taken great strides to further their knowledge to put their best foot forward to give the community the best possible field for recreational activities. Oaklawn's field has impacted on the community by allowing more recreational activities and a beautiful green space for everyone to enjoy. Many times, when the team is at the park, visitors comment on the beauty of Oaklawn. During football season, our recreation



tells us every week that she gets many compliments on how nice the field is and how everyone always loves coming up to play at Oaklawn park. It is always such a great feeling to know that the residents of the North Ogden appreciate and see the hard work that goes into the job that we do. It encourages our team to strive to excellence every day we show up to work.

We have laser grades our field to give us the best possible chance to create a safe and playable field. We top dress the field multiple times a year to help turn the soil into a dirt/ sand mix to help with drainage and playability. We have a great fertilizer program in place that contains a water retention agent to cut down on our water use.







DEPARTMENT OF THE

Salem Parks & Recreation

Department of the Year - Under 15,000 pop.

Salem Parks have made significant strides in enhancing the community's infrastructure. Standout achievements this past year include the completion of 8 miles of paved trail as part of a large Master Trail Plan, offering residents and visitors more opportunities for outdoor recreation. Additional projects such as the completion of Cole Park, the start of Reflections Park, and preparations for a 16-acre Soccer Park highlight the department's commitment to providing recreational spaces to meet the growing needs of the community. The newly built Veterans Memorial honors local heroes and serves as a symbol of respect and remembrance.



Salem Recreation hosts vibrant events including Salem Days, which spans nine days featuring 34 events and creates strong community bonds. Newer events like a Treasure Hunt for families and Historical Tours of the city, along with perennial favorites like the Easter Egg Hunt, Summer Concert Series, and Goosebump Gala, promote family-friendly fun and strengthen community ties. Salem's unique Pond Town Christmas features floating trees on the water and displays that are offered free to the community, bringing holiday joy.

In 2024, Salem City committed to becoming a Certified City of Kindness. The recreation department has served as the organizational hub for the "Kindness Creates Peace" initiative. This program fosters a culture of kindness and peace, involving city departments, schools, and recreation programs truly showcasing Salem as The City of Peace and a welcoming and compassionate place for all. Salem has worked diligently to promote its community image and sense of place over the past year. In June 2024, city officials signed a Resolution for Kindness and committed to becoming a Certified City of Kindness through the One Kind Act a Day organization. This commitment led to the creation of the Kindness Creates Peace initiative, with the recreation department acting as the organizational hub. The initiative works to foster new, and promote existing kind acts in schools, city departments, and recreation programs, with strong support from elected officials.

Manti, Ephraim, Gunnison & Mount Pleasant Recreation

Department of the Year - Under 15,000 pop.

Wasatch County Senior Center

Department of the Year - 15,000-50,000 pop.

In 2024, we celebrated Wasatch County Senior Center's 50th year of service to our seniors. We are so lucky to have the history of when the center started. We displayed photos, newsletters and information about the trips taken and members from the 1980's and on. They had an amazing start up group of a couple dozen, now we have several hundred members.

Our center serves lunch twice a week at The Center as well as Meals on Wheels. Our food is prepared in our own kitchen by amazing people. The Wasatch County Council and management team are great supporters of our Center. Anything that we need they have been willing to help. Everything from helping serve meals, delivering meals or procuring new equipment we need. We have many classes and programs at the center, we



offer grief counseling, tax help, crafts, dancing, ceramics and exercise classes. We have a fully equipped ceramics room, billiard room, music room etc. We are so lucky to have many volunteers to teach classes and the senior center staff that plans so many activities and trips. We have fun games like bingo, bunco, bridge. We also have puzzles to put together. For our county fair the seniors put together a 60,000 piece puzzle that was finished in 4 1/2 months and was 29 feet x 8 feet long when finished. It was very impressive to see. We also had our first seniors' farmers markets in the spring and summer that gives our seniors fresh vegetables and fruit. We also have cooking classes through USU.

The vision of our senior center is to provide opportunities to enjoy other people and have new experiences. Wasatch County has a population of over 37,000 our seniors are about 10% of that. Our meals on wheels delivery makes sure that each senior that is eligible receives at least one good meal a day. We also have buses that pick up our seniors and bring them to the center to enjoy a meal or activities with other seniors. This gives them the opportunity to visit with others, and enjoy time out of their home and make great friends.

American Fork Community Services Department

Department of the Year - 15,000-50,000 pop. In 2022 American Fork City changed from American Fork Fitness and Recreation to American Fork Community Services (AF CSD). This entailed many logistical changes, but most impactfully it brought together (7) different divisions to provide services to our community under one department. Now equipped with the staffing, resources, and responsibilities the CSD of AF includes Parks, Recreation, Fitness Center, Senior Center, Library, Cemetery and City Maintenance. Fully embracing the notion of "Cradle to Grave" or "Beginning to End" the team members all feel a responsibility and



opportunity to provide services, programs and facilities that improve the quality of life for all our residents, visitors, neighbors, and businesses. We strive to provide a community where people want to live, work and play. The department has been able to navigate changes and each of the divisions are providing more, doing more, impacting the community more. As our community continues to grow and change like most communities in Utah, we take our responsibility to find ways to provide facilities, programs, and services for everyone serious. In the American Fork Community Services Department, we have a committed, skilled, passionate, hungry, humble and smart team of employees that work towards tackling this challenge every day.

Primarily funded by the city general fund and taxpayers' dollars, AF CSD strives to be diligent and creative in obtaining and utilizing funding. The fitness center originally build in 1993 continues to age but staff are working to stay fresh and relevant, improve the city subsidy in the facility and looking forward to an expansion/rebuild. Each year for the past (9) years we have received about \$1 million dollars to invest in our parks, recreation, and trails system. This year we obtained over \$1 million dollars in grants from the city PARC program and State Recreation Grants. We have been able to add new playgrounds, restrooms at parks, rebuild or disc golf course, renovation of our oldest full size baseball field including new lights, new basketball court, new (6) court pickleball complex, and several other projects. This year we are working on a project to rebuild our boat harbor on Utah Lake by utilizing \$2 million from the State of Utah and \$1.5 million from Utah County in addition to city funding. Aside from the funding, our greatest asset, like all departments, is our team. We have a great mix of seasoned veterans that have been with the city close to 30 years working alongside some new recreation professionals that have joined our team in the past 2 years. We strive to be active participants in URPA and CURPA so that we can stay connected, network with the best professionals around and stay abreast of latest trends and happenings in the great world of Parks & Recreation.





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Draper Parks & Recreation

Department of the Year - Over 50,000 pop.

Draper Parks and Recreation is pleased to be nominated for "Department of the Year". As a department, we feel Draper City is one of the premier places to live in the entire USA, and we commonly hear it is because of the large number of trails, parks, open space and recreation opportunities.

With over 50 parks and over 150 miles of trails within our city, we punch way above the national average. We have worked with volunteer committee, private residents and different foundations to raise funds for

some of these projects to save the tax paying residents. Draper has become a "go-to" for mountain biking in the USA. Our staff works hard every day to maintain these icons of our city.

With 50 parks, including specialty parks like a large arena for events, large amphitheaters for concerts and plays, a bike park, a new in 2024 18-hole disc golf course, we are very proud of our parks and our parks staff. This all goes to make Draper City a "high quality" life city.

We have taken steps to preserve over 4,000 acres and placed them recently in conservation easements to be preserved forever (Corner Canyon and Traverse Range Conservation Easements). Our staff is lean and we all have lots to do every day, but everyone in the department is dedicated to Parks and Recreation and "making life better". Every city is great, but we feel here in Draper that the Parks and Recreation Department is second to none. The staff within the department cares and produce awesome trails and projects for the enjoyment of residents and beyond, all without costing the city additional funds. Very innovative!


Herriman Parks, Recreation & Events

Department of the Year - Over 50,000 pop.

Facing staffing shortages, turnover, and a budget decrease, Herriman City's Parks, Recreation and Events Department made strides by enhancing programs, events, and facilities. The Fort Herriman Rodeo expanded to three days, bolstered by improved organization and cost tracking. A revamped reservation system simplified requests for parks, fields, arenas, and event permits. Trails benefited from new connectors, trailheads, and landscaping, while water usage was reduced through drought-resistant grass in open spaces.

Theme ice-skating nights doubled, showcasing musical and movie themes that attracted larger crowds during traditionally slower periods. A twomonth fishing program taught 25 youth weekly about best practices, and Fort Herriman Towne Days grew into a seven-day celebration with

additional activities, contests, and a more efficient parade pre-staging process. "Tree Time with Trent" workshops continued to inform residents about proper tree care.



The department has implemented a series of strategic improvements and innovations to benefit both operations and the community. The annual rodeo expanded to 3 days allowing more community members to attend while strengthening partnerships with the rodeo committee and sponsors. A revamped reservation process for parks, fields, and arenas, along with a streamlined Special Event Permit procedure, has increased efficiency across multiple departments. Trail development efforts introduced asphalt links, additional mountain bike trails, and extended foot-and-hoof routes. The ice ribbon's themed nights doubled, drawing larger crowds on traditionally slower evenings.

St. George Parks & Community Services Departmen of the Year - Over 50,000 pop.

The St. George Parks and Community Services Department enhances quality of life through innovative projects, exceptional programs, and world-class events. The successful passage of the Trails, Parks, and Recreation G.O. Bond and the renewal of the RAP Tax, reflects the community's trust in the department's vision for enhancing recreational amenities.

The department has made significant strides in upgrading outdated parks by completing playground remodels at Mathis Park, Royal Oaks Park, and Middleton Park. The Pioneer Park Interpretive Trail highlights the department's dedication to preserving local heritage. The recently completed Virgin River South Trail and Halfway Wash Trail serve as essential connections between neighborhoods.

St. George is also home to nationally acclaimed events that showcase the department's ability to inspire and engage. The St. George Marathon, the largest municipal marathon and 14th largest in the U.S., along with the St. George Art Festival, a premier fine art event recognized nationwide, and the Snow Canyon Half Marathon, Utah's largest half marathon.

Through a variety of programs offered such as outdoor adventures, ceramics, neuro pong, and summer camps, the department provides year-round opportunities for residents of all ages and interests. The Parks and Community Services Department continues to set a standard of excellence, elevating St. George as a model city for recreation and community well-being.

The Parks and Community Services Department has introduced innovative and strategic changes that have significantly enhanced the St. George community. This year, the department has undertaken multiple transformative projects, including the construction of Curly Hollow, a Zion National Park-themed outdoor adventure park offering unique recreational opportunities. To promote connectivity and active lifestyles, the department is also expanding the city's trail system by adding miles of new pathways seamlessly integrated into the existing network.





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
